A	Haggai 1:1-4 In the second year of King Darius, in the sixth month, on the first day of the month, the word of the LORD came by Haggai the prophet to Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, governor of Judah, and to Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, saying, 2 "Thus speaks the LORD of hosts, saying: `This people says, "The time has not come, the time that the LORD'S house should be built."" 3 Then the word of the LORD came by Haggai the prophet, saying, 4 "Is it time for you yourselves to dwell in your paneled houses, and this temple to lie in ruins?" Haggai was written after the remnant returned from the Babylonian captivity. YHVH is displeased with two things. • Despite having built and living in their own homes, the people have put the building of YHVH's house off to a later time. • The people, the work of their hands, and their offerings are unclean.
